

FROM THE MANSE...

Dear Friends

I want to share with you a brief update on the state of play regarding



the Presbytery Mission Plan and its outworking locally. As you may be aware the draft mission plan was published in February of this year and this was followed by a period of consultation with every Kirk Session (including ours) over the spring and early summer. In addition a thorough process of assessing every building owned by the Church across the Presbytery (called the Asset Management Building Audit) has taken place over the summer and the Presbytery's Planning and Development Committee have been reviewing the draft plan in the light of all the data. Two meetings of the Presbytery are scheduled during November at which the final draft of the Mission Plan will be discussed and voted on before being submitted to the General Assembly's Presbytery Mission Plan Implementation Group for its approval.

Meanwhile the Session Clerks and Ministers of Cleish, Fossoway, Kinross and Orwell & Portmoak held a number of meetings to consider how the Kinross-shire churches could work more closely together going forward. A proposal for the formation of a formal Parish Grouping was developed and then considered by each of the four Kirk Sessions before being brought to a conference meeting on 22 September at which there was detailed discussion of the proposal around tables with representatives of each Kirk Session. Each Kirk Session then met separately to vote on the Basis of Parish Grouping. I can report that there was unanimous approval from all four Kirk Sessions.

In the near future we will be calling a meeting of the congregation to report on the final outcome of the Presbytery Mission Planning process and its implications for us here and to put the Basis of Parish Grouping to the congregation for its approval. Detailed information will be made available before the meeting and there will be ample opportunity for the asking of questions.

Meanwhile the worship, the ministry and the mission of the Church continue to develop as we seek to face the challenges of our times. No-one is saying that the road ahead will be without its bumps but if we are prepared to work together under God, we will advance God's Kingdom even if the institutional Church declines.

MINISTRY UPDATES

Rev Austin Wicks and New Beginnings

As I am writing this article, I find myself surrounded by New Beginnings. As an American pastor having just two months of experience in the Church of Scotland I find myself repeatedly surprised by all the little things that are new in my life here. Alicia and I went for a walk through the woods and found ourselves unable to make it very far because of all the amazing photo opportunities for us along the path.

In addition to the experiences that life has brought us thus far, I have the privilege and blessing to be a part of Kinross Parish Church during a time of great change. The Church of Scotland is changing presbytery boundaries and Kinross itself is joining hands with our neighbors.

Alicia and I have felt so blessed and welcomed by the people of Kinross that we were compelled to find a way to give in return. We have found that pathway forward, in perhaps the silliest of new beginnings here, with the start of a Dungeons and Dragons group.

If you do not know, Dungeons and Dragons is a storytelling tabletop roleplaying game. You have a game master (Alicia and I) who is the narrator of the story. As the narrator sets the scene the players (the church youth) decide what their characters will do to interact with the world, to help one another and to find solutions to problems. It is a wonderful game for community building and so we wanted to try and bring that joy to the youth of Kinross.

We had our first game on 21 October with 12 young people in attendance as well as a handful of adult volunteers. It was a spectacular night where our church youth really came alive and came closer together. There was laughter, excitement, and of course food. I want to thank Ann Marie for helping us to organize this event. I feel truly grateful to all of the youth who came out to make such an event a success, and their enthusiasm to keep playing has also been a delight. Though they kindly asked for us to do this every week, I explained that Alicia and I would need more time to prepare for each session.

So for now we are playing bi-weekly, but full of enthusiasm and joy. I look forward to sharing more stories of the wonderful ways in which we are serving Kinross Parish Church and the community.





In Conversation with Alan McKay

As part of his second year of training to be a Minister, Alan is with us until Easter. Kin-nections caught up with him on Zoom.

Alan and his wife,

Emily, and young boys, Cameron and Lewis, live in Perth. He was working as a scientist and worshipping at the Steeple Church in Dundee when Alan felt the time had come to answer God's call so embarked on his ministry journey. Alan's training coincides with a time of great structural change across the Church of Scotland but hopes that when he enters parish ministry

he will be involved in new and exciting Kingdom building. But Alan rests in the knowledge that God has a plan and, through prayer, he will be shown the way.

Alan is particularly interested in the intersection of faith and science, encouraging dialogue so that people feel confident having conversations about their faith in the context of an increasingly secular society. For Alan, God is a scientist, so faith and science are not mutually exclusive but, rather, enhance one another to inspire awe and wonder. If this is an area that interests you, Alan would be pleased to chat with you.

Alan is thankful for the support and encouragement he is receiving from Rev Alan and from Rev Austin and for the welcome he has received from Kinross Parish Church.

Ordination of Anne Redpath

Anne has successfully completed all her training to be a Minister and was ordained by the Presbytery of Perth on 2 November. Until Presbytery Mission Plans are approved across Scotland it is not possible for parish vacancies to be filled, so the General Assembly agreed that probationers be ordained to a particular sphere of service. Anne has been appointed to the role of 'Presbytery chaplaincy, to develop Discipleship and Mission to aid integration of linked congregations'. She has also recently become Interim Moderator for the vacancy at Errol linked with Kilspindie and Rait.

Anne and her husband, Rev Jim Redpath, have been members of our congregation since Jim retired from full-time ministry. Our prayers and support go with Anne in her important new role helping Ministers and congregations through the changes coming to the Presbytery.

Crossfire - new series starting!



Ukraine Update

Rev Alan received news in October from The Great Church Debrecen, our partners in Hungary. Kinross Parish Church is helping them support the shelter house project in Csongor, Ukraine.

"It is a hard year for everyone. Just a short report. In Csongor, the Housing project is in process. I keep contact with Rev. Pocsai Sándor. He will come next week to Debrecen and I will have more information. We have more and more refugees in Debrecen, but they do not live in camps. They hire houses or buy houses for themselves, and as we see, they do not want to return to Ukraine. They try to make their living here. Some of them visit church services. God bless you all!"

Reflecting on the 2022 Kinross Parish Church-MAF Partnership

Huge thanks to all who have this year supported the KPC partnership with Mission Aviation Fellowship for their operations in Uganda.

Uganda is a refuge of hope for huge numbers of refugees fleeing from South Sudan and the Democratic Republic of Congo. Because the condition of Uganda's roads makes overland travel dangerous, MAF flights enable humanitarian and mission partners to arrive safely at destinations where they are assisting the victims of violence, providing nutrition, education and healthcare to children, and support that is lifting thousands out of poverty. Fifty national staff and 18 international staff run the MAF Uganda operation. Six planes fly to 36 locations supporting over 200 partner organisations.

Here's a brief update on our KPC-MAF Uganda partnership year:

In January, we welcomed Ruth, Duncan and Samuel Jack to a Sunday service when they gave us insight into their inspirational lives of service to the Lord through MAF. Ruth had just been appointed Country Director for MAF in Uganda after three years jointly running the MAF operations in Arnhem Land, Australia with her husband, Duncan. This was their first speaking engagement in the UK as they sought to garner support for Ruth's upcoming posting. Donations subsequently made at the various events below raised £1,100. In addition, some members of our church are now directly supporting Ruth's work through regular giving.

In February we hosted a "Swansong" musicallyenriched evening of interview with Andy Swanson who was leaving MAF after 11 years' service as an aircraft maintenance engineer - the last seven of which had been in Uganda.

The Talla Park Swing Orchestra got us "In the Mood" for a fun quiz night in April hosted by MAF's Andy Martin.

Ruth, Duncan and Samuel moved to Uganda in May and are now settled into their new country, culture and climate. You can keep up to date via their Facebook page: the Jacksin Uganda. Please continue to hold them in your prayers.

On Sunday 12 June we hosted an MAF exhibition of a plane and flight simulator alongside a Youth Rescue Challenge at Kirkgate Park. Ten youth teams entered the challenge, which was won by the Chen family. The event was supported by KYTHE bands and included a BBQ.

At the end of August, the church stall at the Summer Farmers' Market was themed on our partnership with MAF. We were delighted to sign up 40 new MAF supporters that day!

Finally, on Sunday 30 October, we held a MAFternoon Tea to celebrate the partnership and to thank all friends and supporters. With sincere gratitude to donors who gave via the September Communion and Harvest Thanksgiving offerings, a cheque from KPC for a further £1,000 was presented to MAF representatives on the day. This was also the first day of the MAF annual Global Week of Prayer when the theme was from John 1:5:

"The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness can never extinguish it" (NLT).

Hi from Malawi!

I am currently volunteering here in Malawi for three months at M'bwana Children's Mission in Lirangwe, near Blantyre. I am very lucky to be staying with the lovely Samanyika family. The days are very long and busy, starting at 6.30am and usually getting home sometime after 5pm. There are lots of children here, mainly orphans and children who are in vulnerable situations, and they are all given two meals each day and provided with the supplies and opportunity to learn.

The centre I work at is a primary school; if the children are able to pass the exams and go to secondary school and university, the mission also assists with this, providing them with accommodation, and financial and personal support. The main school hall is also a church each Sunday for everyone in the surrounding villages to attend.

I have been teaching English and other subjects to the classes, making posters and resources such as simple flashcards to help the teachers, playing games with the children, reading with them, and just helping out wherever I can, whether marking or organising classrooms etc.

It has been a truly surreal experience so far, seeing a completely different way of life and understanding the struggles these people face as well as the triumphs, and witnessing their amazingly joyful attitude to life, learning and faith.

Malawi is known as 'the warm heart of Africa' and this is the perfect way to describe a nation filled with many caring, helpful and positive people, particularly the wonderful staff here. I will forever see my life in Kinross in a new, more appreciative way.

Please Pray for Women and Girls in Iran and Elsewhere

The suffering, physical violence and even death, experienced by women and girls in Iran, because of their protests at the death of a young woman, Masha Amini, on being arrested by the morality police for not wearing a hijab properly, has been widely reported. Sadly, the suffering of Christian women and girls, simply because they are Christians, is often unrecognised and unreported.

Such persecution takes several forms. A girl may become a Christian in a Muslim household and, as a result, be placed under house arrest, in order to deny her access to help and understanding from the Christian community. In Pakistan a Christian girl, often no more than 12 or 13, can be kidnapped and declared, against her will, to have become a Muslim and forcibly married to a Muslim. In some countries if a wife becomes a Christian, she may be thrown out of her home and, in these countries, it is often impossible for a 'discarded' woman to survive on her own, given the lowly status of women there.

Several Christian charities, such as Open Doors (https://www.opendoorsuk.org), are helping such women and girls and deserve our prayerful support.

Queen Elizabeth's Faith - Our Servant Queen

On 30 June 2021, the volunteers at the Children's Wood, an outdoor community-run area for children in Glasgow, were informed of a visit by a VIP. Having no idea what to expect, they were amazed when, out of the cars which drew up, emerged Her Majesty the Queen. This was only a few months after the death of her beloved husband.

This was just one example of her fulfilment, right to the end, of a promise made as a young woman: "When I was 21, I pledged my life to the service of our people and I asked for God's help to make good that vow. ... I do not regret, or retract, one word of it."

Queen Elizabeth had a strong personal faith. In a message to the Bible Society, of which she was patron, on her 90th birthday, she said: "I have been - and remain - very grateful for your prayers, and to God for his steadfast love. I have indeed seen his faithfulness." Queen Elizabeth knew her Bible and prayer book intimately. People with whom she discussed her faith said she would correct you if you mis-quoted a verse.

Queen Elizabeth attended church regularly, worshipping at Crathie Kirk when at Balmoral. The Very Rev Dr Angus Morrison, lately our neighbour at Orwell and Portmoak, preached there on several occasions, including on the Sunday following her death. He wrote: "Sacrificial service was a theme close to the Queen's heart and wonderfully exemplified through the long years of her reign."



What has been heartening in the days and weeks following her death has been the number of times her Christian faith has been a topic of discussion in the media and in private conversation. What an example she was, our Servant Queen!


And may we also dedicate ourselves afresh to God's kingdom of justice and peace.

Outreach Group Weekend Away

The Outreach Group organised a Weekend Away at Gowanbank SU Camp, Ayrshire at the end of September. A total of 24 adults and seven young people attended; Rev Dr Robert Calvert, Locum Minister at Orwell & Portmoak Church, led the discussions. The gathering explored what is Outreach and what works/ does not work. It recognised that Outreach does not mean dragging people in; rather it is listening to God's Word and sharing the Good News message. Time will be taken to reflect on all that was shared then bring together proposals for short, medium and longterm actions. Rev Austin explored with the young people what they were looking for, acknowledging their concerns that their voices had not always been heard. The young people's enthusiasm was inspiring and some of their suggestions have immediately been put into place, such as quiet fidget toys for children during the service.

Four commitments were agreed by the group, which will translate into actions. To commit to:

- Continue to listen and pray so that we are led by God
- 2. Finding ways of building key intergenerational relationships within the Church family and with those who are less engaged
- 3. Living spirit-led lives to reach out in service, being inclusive, available and vulnerable
- 4. Being open to working inclusively with mission partners both locally and internationally

Underlying these commitments is the aim to serve God who can do so much more than we can imagine. These themes reflect those of Growing Young - building intergenerational connections through fellowship and being the best neighbours.
