

Holy Communion, also known as the Lord's Supper, is a sacrament in which the Church remembers the death of Christ by eating bread and drinking wine (elements), symbolising the body and blood of Christ. We celebrate Holy Communion on the first Sunday of March, June, September, and December. A shorter communion is celebrated after the service on the first Sunday of the other months.



TALKING WITH GOD



REFLECTIONS



For many of us, the days and weeks around the turn of the year are a time for reflection on the year just ending and hope for the year ahead. We recognise that, in the grand scheme of things, life is brief and we need to make the most of every minute. Psalm 90 reminds us that fulfilment in life does not depend on how much we have or on the things we achieve. What gives life its purpose and meaning is a living relationship with God. It is this which will empower us and enable us to recognise that the gift of each new day is a fresh opportunity to love and serve Him.

"Oh Lord, thank you for your unfailing love, new to us each morning. Make your presence known to us in times of trial and times of happiness. May we sing your praises with joy each day because your steadfast love and goodness are with us always - both today and in the years to come. Amen."

Dear Friends,

May I first of all take this opportunity to say how deeply touched I was by your thoughtfulness recently in recognising the 30th anniversary of my ordination to the Ministry of Word and Sacrament,

by the attendance of so many at the special service and the gifts you gave to Christine and me. To you all, my sincere thanks. Although much has changed over the last three decades, I continue to know the prompting of God's Spirit to preach the unsearchable riches of Christ and I pray that together we may continue to work for the advancement of God's Kingdom in this place and beyond.

As we enter into the season of Advent and prepare ourselves for our annual Christmas celebrations, I would like to invite you to take a conscious journey of faith over the coming weeks. Expectations are high - our own and those of other people - and many people are under such great pressure to get things 'just right' that stress builds and disappointment comes easily.

Don't let us ever lose sight of the transforming wonder of the Christmas message, that the Lord God of heaven and earth has stepped into our world and seeks to make His dwelling with us still. The work of transformation needs to continue in and through each one of us. Many, like King Herod and the religious leaders, had no time for the Child of Bethlehem; others, like the startled shepherds who were disturbed as they went about their work, and like the wise men from the East whose studies were interrupted by a strange discovery, went out of their way to seek out the Son of God. Who will we most resemble this Christmas? There was no room at the inn for Christ to be born, but let there be room in your home and in your heart for Him this Christmas and let your simple but heartfelt prayer be in the words of the carol: 'Be born in us tonight.'

Make time to be still each day during Advent - you could perhaps light a candle, sit for a few moments and pray. Fix your eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith; draw closer to Him than you have ever been before; and let God lead you in new paths as you follow Him more closely into the coming year.

Why not challenge the world's expectations (and your own) and do something quite different this Christmas?

Hear the call of the angels that sounds forth still, and follow the star of hope that still shines on.

RADICAL ACTION PLAN

'The future of the Church for years to come'



A new focus on engaging with people under 40, £25m to be spent on church growth projects, 100 new worshipping communities to be formed. These are just three of the proposals agreed by this year's General Assembly of the Church of Scotland in its Radical Action Plan. This followed the rejection in 2018 of an earlier proposal as not being radical enough. Some have described this year's decisions as 'the most significant Assembly since the Union of 1929' (of the Church of Scotland and the Free Church of Scotland).

You may have heard on the news of some of the changes already happening around Scotland as presbyterie s seek to turn the challenges



of Scotland faces - an operating deficit, declining membership and a shortage of ministers - in to a renewed focus on 'equipping churches for mission in their local context'. The central



administration costs are to be reduced by around 30% and presbyteries are to be reduced from 43 to around 12. Shetland Presbytery has already been amalgamated with Aberdeen and the three Fife Presbyteries are on the road to an amalgamation. Both Aberdeen and Shetland have approved a plan which sees around one half of their churches closed so that effort can be concentrated on 'well equipped spaces in the right places'. This includes, in Aberdeen, the opening of four new churches. Here in our Presbytery of Perth, a new church is starting in a shop unit in the new development north of Perth and initial discussions are being held about Presbytery amalgamations. Locally, the Kirk Sessions of the Loch

> Leven group of churches have already held a joint meeting to consider the way forward.

Our Session Clerk, Jaffrey Weir says: "This is a challenging but exciting time for the Church of Scotland. I would urge all our members to read the special 4-page supplement summarising the Radical Action Plan which I commend to you. Copies

TO SPEAK WITH THE **ACCENT OF HEAVEN**

Celebrating 30 years of ministry with Alan Reid - Irene McFarlane reports

On Saturday 5 October, a large company of members and friends of our congregation and neighbouring congregations met in the church for a special service to mark the 30th anniversary of the ordination of our minister, Alan Reid. Among those present to share in this joyful occasion were members from Alan's previous charge in Newcastleton in the Borders. We were delighted, also, that Alan's two predecessors, John Munro, with his wife, Pat, and Leslie Barr, were able to join

Angus Morrison from Orwell and Portmoak welcomed the congregation and delivered a reflection. He joked that praising Alan within Kinross Parish Church was like "sending black pudding to

Stornoway"! He thanked Alan for his "friendship, grace and many gifts" and said that "for 30 years, Christ's servant, Alan, has been teaching the life-transforming message for individuals, communities and nations".

Alan's long-term friend, Ken Stott, now minister in the North Church in Perth, reflected on Alan's student days in Edinburgh and how a group had met regularly for prayer and mutual support. This group continues to meet twice a year. Ken read messages from others who





could not attend the service. One message said, "Alan is an all-round good parish minister. A preacher centred in real life."

Jaffrey Weir, Session Clark, paid tribute to the contribution the church in Newcastleton had made to developing Alan's skills as a Minister, and also reflected on the developments in the church's activities in Kinross in Alan's time. He acknowledged the role in Alan's life and ministry played by his wife, Christine, and their sons, Sandy and Douglas.

Among presentations made to Alan from the Church were two bibles, including a pocket-sized one, a hand-painted commemorative plague and a card, designed by Anne Sutherland. An enormous "30" cake, made by Anne Miller, was enjoyed by everyone when we had refreshments afterwards. A collection was taken for a charity of Alan's choosing, the Scottish Bible Society, and this raised over £400.

In his concluding words, Alan reminisced about the time of his early ministry and particularly the ordination itself. He spoke of Christian friends who had inspired him then, and particularly the Rev Tom Preston who preached at the ordination service and charged him to "speak with the accent of heaven".

PERTH STREET PASTORS

A couple of years ago we heard about the work of Perth Street Pastors and the Minister invited us to consider volunteering: Derek Goodwin from our congregation did just that. He undertook the training and is now commissioned as a street pastor, giving up two nights a month to "listen, care, help" on the busy Saturday night streets of Perth.

"We work in teams of three and have a uniform so are instantly recognisable, and we offer practical assistance with things like ponchos, flipflops, bottles of



water and sweets, and we also carry first aid equipment for minor injuries, but we are also there to listen." Not everyone is having to say thank you.

are experiencing mental anguish and turmoil about all sorts of problems and find in the street pastors a non-judgmental, compassionate, listening ear. The pastors can't necessarily solve the problems, but they can give contacts for organisations that can

help, they can pray with and for the person and, importantly, they can show that they care.

"It's very rewarding. It's a practical way of expressing my faith. And, what I wasn't expecting, is that it can be fun." People they have helped one week with, say, a poncho to keep out the rain, return the next week to say thank you.



The police liaise with door staff at pubs and clubs and alert the pastors if someone is in difficulty and the pastors can respond with that precious commodity - time. They can stay alongside the person until the situation is resolved. Sometimes, the mere presence of street pastors can calm a heated situation with

intervention being unnecessary.

Would Derek recommend volunteering? "Yes, with more volunteers, the Perth Street Pastors could do more. I get as much out of the role as I put into

it. When we finish at 3am we feel we have done something worthwhile."

The Brigade: Milestone Approaching

Kinross BB was founded during the Second World War by local teacher Roddy Beaton utilising the experience of the boys who had been evacuated from the Shettleston area of Glasgow who were members of the 1st Shettleston Company. The Shettleston boys were joined by many local boys from Arngask and around Kinross-shire as Boys' Brigade's popularity quickly grew. The Kinross Company recognises that the 1st Shettleston can be regarded as our "parent" Company. The founding of the Kinross Company in 1939 was officially endorsed by BB HQ early in 1940. There had been a BB Company in Kinross before this in fact, from 1892 till 1912. Taking these 20 years along with the time the current Company has been in existence, we are all looking forward to celebrating the Company's 100 years of service in 2020. All previous Company Captains, with the exception of

founder Captain Roddy Beaton and current Captain David Munro, have come from boys who served in the Company: Jim Clark, Bill Daniels, Jack Hepburn, Alec Melville, and Henry Hardie.

The new session has started and all three sections are back in action. All three sections are learning about early Old Testament characters, took part in the Company's Annual Enrolment Service, and were on parade on Armistice Sunday at the Parish Church.

Fairtrade Sports Balls Changing Lives

While you are buying your Fairtrade Christmas hampers and cards from the Traidcraft stall please also take a look at our Fairtrade Footballs! They are £10 which is a bargain for such good quality and every ball bought makes a difference to the skilled workers who make them.

Bala Sport is the only importer of Fairtrade sports balls in the UK and they give a fairer deal to sports ball workers in Pakistan (where 70% of the world's stitched balls are made) and India.

Fairtrade ensures that workers are paid fairly, work in safe conditions and have access to union representation, and that there is no child or enforced labour. Workers benefit from the extra Fairtrade Premium paid by Bala Sport through democratically elected Premium Committees. Through these the ball producers decide which social development projects

Committees. Through these the ball producers decide which social development projects to invest the fund in, such as free eye and diabetes tests, free school books, free transport to and from work and a shop for cut-price food and household items. The Fairtrade Premium has been used to partfund water purification plants built outside factory gates, allowing anyone access to free, safe drinking

Once the theme is decided, the fabrics are gathered and the work begins, "It is fun and we enjoy what we do".




YOUR KIN-NECTIONS MAGAZINE NEEDS YOU!
