

FROM THE MANSE...

Dear Friends

The discussions have been lengthy, but fruitful and hopeful and, as I write, the proposals for a Union of the Kinross-shire parishes and a Team Ministry are before the congregations for a decision.



If approved, the united parish will come into being on 1 January 2025, taking in the former parishes of Arngask, Cleish, Fossoway, Kinross, Orwell and Portmoak. Going forward, there will be three primary places of worship - Fossoway, Kinross and Orwell churches, with provision for different forms of worship and church activities at different times in the week in the communities across the county where there is no church building.

A new team minister, to be based at Crook of Devon, will be recruited during the early months of 2025. Until then, the Rev Beverley Stevenson will continue as Locum for Cleish & Fossoway. The Rev Robert Calvert, who has served as Locum Minister at Orwell & Portmoak since the beginning of 2022, will continue to work parttime as Associate Minister based at Orwell. Alex Johnson will continue to serve as Probationer. All the ministers will have a role across the whole of Kinross-shire.

Although for governance purposes everything will change from the turn of the year, practical changes will only gradually become evident. Although there is deep sadness that the church buildings at Arngask, Cleish and Portmoak will be closing, it is nonetheless a time of great opportunity, a time to explore new ways of being the Church for the 21st century.

We hold on to the same Gospel that St Serf first brought to Kinross-shire nearly 1,500 years ago and people today are still encountering the same living Jesus Christ who has brought transformation and new life to thousands in these parishes over the centuries. If you have not yet discovered the blessings that come in joining others in the adventure of following Christ, why not come and find out what it is all about at this time of new beginnings? You will be very welcome.



The Company started back at the end of August, earlier than usual as we have so much to fit in before the year is out! By the time this is published the



Friday 7 March 2025 is the date for the next World Day of Prayer, hosted by the Fossoway congregation. The theme is 'I made you wonderful' and it is written by the women of the Cook Islands. There will be the usual afternoon meeting as well as the evening one.

Chinese Churches: fall in line - or else?

The ruling Chinese Communist Party (CCP) has always, to a greater or lesser extent, sought to suppress, if not totally destroy, expressions of Christian faith (and of other religions). However, by God's good grace, rather than disappear, the number of Christians has increased and there are now, by some estimates, perhaps as many as over 90 million.

However, since President Xi Jinping came to power in 2013, there has been a much greater effort to control the Christian church - and in a much more subtle way. Through a process known as Sinicization, the regime is exerting intense pressure on the church to align its beliefs more and more closely to the Communist ideology. Thus, there is pressure in certain theological colleges to study Xi Jinping's thoughts and 'adjust' Christian theology to be 'compatible' with his values. It is even proposed that the Bible should be scrutinised and modified to fit Xi Jinping's 'doctrine'.

The state-recognised Protestant Church, known as the Three-Self Patriotic Movement, has always been subject to close supervision and a degree of manipulation by the state, but the present attack on core Christian beliefs and values is unprecedented. Couple with that the fact that widespread technology, involving cameras in churches and face recognition availability, will make it extremely difficult and dangerous not to fall in line with what the regime dictates.

Of course, there are the 'hidden' or underground churches to which many, perhaps the majority, of committed Christians belong. In the past, they may have been to some extent tolerated but now, being non-compliant to Sinicization, they are being hunted down, their members persecuted and their pastors severely punished and imprisoned.

Pray for our brothers and sisters in China.



Listening for God's voice: join the new, monthly Discernment Group

"HE GOES AHEAD OF THEM AND THE SHEEP FOLLOW, BECAUSE THEY KNOW HIS VOICE." (JOHN 10:4B)

Our church services and small groups are full of the analogy of 'listening' to God but for most of us that will remain an analogy. Like so much spiritual language, it makes intuitive sense yet can leave us wondering what does that actually mean? What does it feel like? Sound like and look like? How do we live out that analogy of listening to God?

Over the course of 2025, I will be running a discernment group. This is a group for people who are trying to figure out what God might be asking them to do. Perhaps you are going through a big life change or have a sense that you would like to do something more or something new and would like to explore whether God has any ideas for you. We will take the year to figure out and experience what we mean when we talk about 'listening' to God.

The group will meet all together once a month to learn different ways of 'listening' for God's voice as well as to encourage each other and even try out an idea. In addition, members of the group will form smaller groups of three who can better support one another over the year.

The hope is, by the time I finish my probationary period at the end of 2025, we will all have a firmer sense of the timbre of God's voice and be able to follow that voice into the future.

Christians and Climate Change

'Let's Sing!' Celebrates its Fifth Birthday

Research has shown that singing is a beneficial activity for all, enabling people to recapture memories and enjoy social contact in a supportive, happy environment. Let's Sing! was conceived as an informal singing group, primarily for those living with dementia and their carers.

It is hard to believe that we celebrated the group's fifth birthday in June. On one hand it does not seem that long since our inaugural meeting when we nervously waited to see if anyone would come. On the other hand, so much has happened in the intervening years!

Covid and the pandemic had an adverse impact on our group. We were unable to meet for two years because choirs and singing groups were among the last to be permitted to restart after Lockdown. Our membership was more frail and for many of them the two year hiatus meant they were no longer able to attend or

felt vulnerable in social settings. Consequently, post Lockdown, our numbers have been smaller, but no less enthusiastic!

Let's Sing! continues to evolve. Our primary aim will always be to reach out to those living with dementia and their carers and we are keen to increase these numbers at our forthcoming sessions. However, we have found that others have welcomed the opportunity to come and enjoy social contact, friendship, a wee cuppa and a good sing. We are very happy to welcome anyone.

In August we took the decision to relocate from the Church to our Church Centre, which offered simpler technology and a less formal setting. We have held two successful sessions here, welcoming new members and having a great sing amid much hilarity.

If you know of someone with dementia who you think would benefit from Let's Sing! please let them know about the group, or if you would like to try it out for yourself just come along. There is no need to book a space.

Let's Sing! usually meets on the second Sunday of the month 2.30-4pm. There is no November or January meeting. We have our Big Christmas Sing on Sunday 8 December (festive hats optional).

Seeds for Growth: resources for mission

In just a few years,
Church of Scotland
central administration,
committees and costs have been greatly

committees and costs have been greatly reduced, the '121' headquarters is to be sold, and the number of presbyteries has been cut from 43 to 14.

This frees up resources for mission at local level, through the new £25 million Seeds for Growth fund, a one-off sum to be spent over five to 10 years. It is aimed at initial funding

for new church communities; developing faith in those under the age of 40; and fostering the revitalisation



of existing congregations. In Kinross-shire, a substantial grant has been given for a KYTHE youth ministry, but grants can be for as little as £1,000 to try out a new idea or run an event.

The Presbytery of Perth recently hosted the Seeds for Growth Roadshow, under the heading 'Strength for Today, Hope for Tomorrow'. This was a challenging but ultimately uplifting day of thinking about our way forward, set within the context of worship and prayer and led by Rev Tommy MacNeil, convener of the Faith Action Programme Leadership Team, and Rev Neil Glover, convener of the group which allocates Seeds for Growth funding.

In his book Finding our Voice, one of Neil's conclusions is: "Renewal does not necessarily mean a recovery of our numbers, but it does mean recovering these three things: confidence, vocation and faith".


