The Church of Scotland requires that volunteers who work with children, and adults at risk, must be registered with Disclosure Scotland through the PVG scheme and attend Introductory Safeguarding training. This is for the protection of both the volunteers and the groups that they work with. Each church has a Safeguarding panel; at Kinross Parish Church the members are Enid Campbell (Safeguarding Coordinator), Rev Alan Reid, Jaffrey Weir and Lynn Caldwell.

In 2022 sales in the UK of Fairtrade products generated £30 million of Fairtrade Premium for farmers, in addition to the fair price they receive for their goods. Climate Change - A Cause of Persecution of Christians?

Attention has been brought regularly in these pages to both the persecution of minority religious groups, principally Christians, and to the devastating effect of climate change in some of the poorest parts of the world. Thousands of Christians have been killed and droughts and floods have seriously deteriorated the land, including desertification.

Nigeria has experienced the worst persecution of Christians. Fulani herdsmen, either Muslim extremists or supported by Islamic extremists (Boko Haram), regularly murder, rape, kidnap and destroy the houses and churches of Christians. Of the 16 Christians killed each day for being a Christian, at least 12 are from Nigeria.

Not widely reported was the massacre on Christmas Eve by Muslim herdsmen, of at least 198 Christians across the central Plateau state by bands of men armed with guns and machetes,

leaving a further 300 injured. The European Parliament 'strongly condemned' but blamed climate change, pointing out that the mainly Muslim herdsmen were competing for the decreasingly available good land with the mainly Christian farmers. Climate change!

While there would appear to be some merit in this argument, consider what Father Kiely, who has worked in Nigeria for many years, wrote: "The murders were mainly attributed to climate change. The Muslim Fulani herdsmen 'need' to kill Christians, as they have been for many years, to find grazing land for their cattle. This 'necessary' depopulation for the sake of climate change apparently involves burning churches that are filled with worshippers, the destruction of villages, rape, kidnapping and, as on Pentecost Sunday last year, shooting more than 40 people attending Mass."

Whatever conclusion we come to, this situation calls for our prayerful attention and concern.



MAF Update 16 June followed by Soup & Sandwich Lunch

Our Church has supported Mission Aviation Fellowship (MAF) over a number of years. Ruth Jack, MAF's Uganda Country Director, visited Kinross Parish Church with her family before taking up her post there. That was two years ago and the family is now back in Scotland for 'home assignment' for two months.

Ruth will join us on Sunday 16 June, contributing to our morning worship service. This will be followed by a soup & sandwich lunch to which everyone is invited, where we will be able to chat informally with Ruth about her work.

Eco Team: going for gold

Kinross Parish Church Eco-Congregation achieved a silver award for work helping to improve the environment. This included tree planting, local litter-picks and growing vegetables at the allotment with a helping hand from KYTHE. The harvest was donated to the Kinross (Day) Centre, along with jam made from our church fruit trees. We also completed a cycle ride and have placed bug houses and bird feeders in the church garden.

The Eco Team are now looking to achieve the gold award and areas for focus are: evaluating and planning; initiating and coordination; Eco-Congregation involvement; local and national concerns; and global and international concerns.

As part of global actions our Fairtrade team has been very successful. One of our team, Isla



Skea (pictured), is volunteering at Ostional Wildlife Reserve in Costa Rica. Isla and other volunteers are working with marine biologists collecting data in the reserve's hatchery, keeping the beach and oceans free from litter

and carrying out night patrols to ensure safe passage for turtles from the ocean to their nesting sites.

We participated at the Farmers' Market in April and organised a litter-pick in conjunction with Christian Aid Week in May. Crossfire youth group have planned a variety of eco activities.


Choir: fellowship and worship

When we have had to use external contractors, we've been very lucky with the commitment of local tradesmen. It's like painting the Forth Bridge - there is always something requiring attention."

Orwell & Portmoak: uniting our strengths

What might a union between Kinross and Orwell & Portmoak (O&P) look like? Although many decisions have still to be made, some ministries O&P can bring are: Messy Church is a popular monthly event for children on Saturday afternoons. Tea & Blether is a lovely fellowship tea at 2pm monthly on the third Friday. Stramash is a colourful A4 magazine, produced about three times annually and delivered around doors in the parish. It's unclear at present whether there are enough people and funds to continue this. A Church office in South Street (between the golf club and the butchers) is available for the united church to use. Ashlev House care home services are on the first Thursday of the month at 2pm. Orwell Church has been refurbished to a high standard and is both a comfortable and flexible space. Some members of Arngask Church have come down to Milnathort after their church closed. O&P keenly feels the need to find ways to serve the outlying areas of the parish where there will be no regular services (such as Easter Balgedie, Kinnesswood, Scotlandwell and, of course, Glenfarg). Could you see yourself being involved in any of the above?



Reviewing Our Giving

Dear Fellow Members

Come September there will be a Stewardship Campaign to try to increase the Church's income. We are facing a potential deficit this year of around £19,000 and this is unsustainable in the long term.

Among other inflationary costs we have until recently been protected from gas and electricity prices by the national Church of Scotland scheme, but the new one reflects today's costs.
