FROM THE MANSE...



Dear Friends,

The story is told of a child on a visit to the seaside finding hundreds of starfish about to be stranded on a beach at the turn of the high tide. The child bends down and starts throwing the starfish back in, one by one. A

passing adult suggests patronisingly that it's not going to make much of a difference, but the child picks up another starfish and throws it back in to the sea, saying quietly but defiantly, "I can make a difference to that one."

The Church's task is endless and the challenges are immense. The General Assembly of the Church of Scotland this year is looking at the need to take radical action at an institutional and organisational level. The Presbytery of Perth is looking at how ministry and mission can be sustained and developed

from scattered rural areas where there are tiny congregations worshipping in ancient buildings, to the rapidly-growing Bertha Park scheme to the north of Perth where a whole new community is springing up with, as yet, no

Christian witness. The Kirk Session of Kinross at its most recent meeting considered big questions about our children's and youth work and about the contact we have (or do not have) with those on our roll of members who currently do not engage in the life and worship of the church. Nobody thinks that there are any quick or easy answers.

Looking at the big picture may leave us wondering where on earth to start. But each one of us can start somewhere. How about using one of the church invitation cards to invite a friend or neighbour or family member to something that is happening in the church? What might you do as part of 'Walk this Way' on 15 June? Could you volunteer to assist in some way next session with the Junior Church or the Brigade? Would you be interested in getting involved for a time as a member of the Pastoral Group (or one of the other groups of the Kirk Session: Admin & Communication, Discipleship, Finance, Outreach, Property, or Worship), contributing to discussion, sharing your gifts, offering practical support? Occasional help is every bit as useful as a long-term commitment.

Finally, following on from the stewardship focus in our last issue, we hope to be able to report on the congregation's financial position during the course of June. If you have not yet got around to reviewing your offerings, let me encourage you to do so now.

<u>You</u> can make a difference. Every single action counts. Remember the starfish. What will you do today? May God bless you as you serve Him.

Having been asked to provide a brief update on my progress in training for Ordained Local

Ministry, I am grateful for the opportunity to say thank you to all those who have asked my husband Jim how I have been getting on as I have been 'missing in action' on Sunday mornings at KPC! It has been so encouraging to hear of your continued support.

By the time you read this, I will have completed my first placement - six months of being involved in leading worship,

pastoral care, church life, and discussion of issues facing the church today. It was an overwhelmingly positive experience and served to confirm my sense of call into ordained ministry.

The most challenging aspect has been fitting in study around work, family, and placement commitments. Although I enjoy studying, this aspect has been stressful at times, as many of you who have combined work, study, and family life will know, but I have felt very much carried and sustained. I am deeply grateful for your prayers which have given me the strength and energy when I have needed it most and have enabled me to complete my modules successfully.

I am really looking forward to

being in KPC over the summer months before having my formal review of training in September. This is to set the learning priorities for my second church placement, which begins in October, around the same time as I embark on another nine months of part-time distance learning with Aberdeen University in order to complete my Certificate in Christian Studies. All going well, I should then only have a year-long probationary placement to successfully undertake before the required training is complete and I am ordained.

DEBRECEN SCOTTISH CAMP 2019

An update on preparations for the annual mission trip to Hungary

For those of you who have been following our progress, this will be the seventh year of our partnership with the Great Church in Debrecen. Each year, we have taken a team over there to deliver a week's "Scottish Camp" for teenagers in Hungary.

This year there will be a team of 19, the largest ever. The Great Church is delighted by this, as it allows them to increase the number of young people taking part in the camp. Last year, there were 74 young people, 12 translators and 17 Scots. Over 100 of us learning about the Bible and praising God together. It takes guite a bit of preparation for the camp. This year we began our preparation on 6 February. The days of the camp are split into two: the mornings are English lessons and the afternoons are Bible study. This year our topic for the English lessons is "visit Scotland", the subtopics being the Edinburgh Festival, Robert Burns, the Seaside

(the Hungarian young people are fascinated by the sea, as very few of them have seen it), and Highland Games. The topics for the Bible study are the Fruits of the Spirit.

We split into four subgroups and prepare our different lessons. Throughout the week of the camp, the young people move round the different lessons until they have completed them all. Our main focus is to make the lessons enjoyable for the young people so that they can learn whilst having fun.

We are pretty busy preparing for the camp, as we also need to do some fundraising. The Church gives us a donation towards our travel, and we pay the rest. However, we need to raise funds for resources to deliver the workshops, for

our food while we are there, and to entertain our Hungarian visitors for their return visit to Scotland.

This year we have already held a bake sale in Church which raised £350, and we are planning another bake sale for Sunday 23 June.

We are also hosting a **Quiz Evening** in the Rugby Club on **Friday 7 June** at 7.30pm. Please gather your teams together as I'm sure it will be a great evening. Let's see who are our best quizzers!



SUMMER JUST ISN'T SUMMER WITHOUT FAMILY WEEK!

those going into P1 are collected from Swansacre Playgroup.

The children take part in a wide range of activities including songs, Bible stories, drama, games, crafts, and challenges. You're very welcome to go up to the church balcony and watch at the beginning or the end if you'd like to see what's happening.

As well as the morning programme, there is a wide variety of afternoon and evening activities - see back cover for a full timetable.

Apart from the lasers trip and the bowling trip, all of Family Week is free. However, we welcome any donations that you would like

to make. The barbecue is also free, but again we would welcome donations if you are able to contribute towards the cost of the food.

FOCUS ON... OUR CHURCH CENTRE

Have you popped into our Church Centre on the High Street recently? Our much-used, much-loved building has been having some much-needed work, and the past year has seen a repainted Coffee Bar, Lower Hall and Reading Room. The Lower Hall and Reading Room have also been recarpeted. This follows the 2017 project to replace the north and south windows, overseen (with infinite patience) by Norman White.

Looking ahead, we are searching for ways to run our Church Centre more efficiently and keep costs down, particularly utilities usage, and we have joined Eco-Congregation Scotland.

A bit of history: when Kinross' East and West churches merged in the 1980s, the East Church was refurbished and opened in 1983 as our Church Centre, its express purpose being to provide halls and meeting space for community groups.

The Kinross Centre, which supports older people, uses the downstairs suite of rooms during the week and many of our Church groups meet in the building - Junior Church, JamPact, Crossfire, Brigade, Guild and Thursday Group. During the evenings and weekends, and upstairs during weekdays, clubs and organisations hire the various rooms. Our rates of hire are very



reasonable! (Just contact the Church Office for information.)

Remember that the Coffee Stop is open on Saturday mornings 10am to 12 noon for a cuppa and homebaking, and you can pick up some excellent holiday-reading from the second-hand book stall.

YOUTH ALPHA

An update on the recent Alpha course held for teenagers - Shona Sutherland reports

From January to April, about 15 of our young people have been participating in a youth Alpha course.

Most readers will know a bit about Alpha. But for those unfamiliar with the course, it is a weekly course outlining the basics of Christianity. The key thing is that it is conducted in an environment which is very informal, relaxed, and non-judgemental. The material is really well thought out and engaging - and entertaining. Open and frank discussion is encouraged, and as the group bonds over the weeks this becomes easier. Often the courses are conducted outside Church buildings so that people who have little experience of Church don't feel uncomfortable, but for our course, with our young people so busy during the week, we decided to keep it in our Church Centre on a Sunday morning.

Each Sunday morning, we met at 10am for a sumptuous breakfast (many, many thanks to our fabulous cooks and breakfast helpers: Bill, Tina, Kathy, Jane, Sandra, and Jean) before watching DVD-led material and engaging in small group discussion.

In March, we headed off for a weekend away together to Stirling Youth Hostel. We had a brilliant time, managing to include skating, a ghost walk, crafts, and a movie night plus delicious food and of course more time for discussion. There was a lovely sense of togetherness as Rob Packham talked about the difference knowing God had made in his life. Pointing to all the various helpers in the group, he said to the young people "all these people will tell you the same thing".

As one of the leaders, I have really enjoyed the experience. It does no harm to review the basis of our





faith, and it is refreshing to see things through younger eyes and find that the Christian gospel is as relevant now as it ever has been.

We don't know what impact it has had on our teenage group as yet. We just hope and pray that the seeds will take root.


look forward to seeing you there!

The sale of these Traidcraft goodies can be seen as part of our outreach to support our neighbours in every continent in the world."

THE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND - INTERNATIONAL

Did you know that there are Church of Scotland congregations abroad, from Amsterdam to Trinidad, gathered in the International Presbytery? Two have recently been affected by major events.

The Fire at Notre Dame de Paris: Rev Jan Steyn, is the minister of the Scots Kirk in Paris. He is known to many in Kinross from when he was an assistant here. He says: "On the night of the fire we all went to bed with a sense of loss. Notre Dame was a place of awe, mystery and majesty - a calming presence and a reminder of the bigger presence. The disaster had a profound impact on people. I was very moved by the sight of young French people singing psalms, a demonstration of hope and faith. On Tuesday, we woke up with better news than expected," he added. "The fire made us

aware of how vulnerable we are, how vulnerable our treasures, monuments and our world are."

Sri Lanka Bombings on Easter Sunday: The Church of Scotland also has a congregation in Colombo, Sri

Lanka. The Moderator Rt Rev Susan Brown reported: "The congregation was gathering for worship when they heard a bomb go off in a neighbouring hotel. The minister gave people the chance to go home immediately, but most people did not leave, instead staying to worship God and to pray together for everyone touched by these dreadful acts". Chandan de Silva, session clerk at St Andrews, Colombo, described the mood in the congregation as distraught but steadfast.



The New Scottish Hymns band is a Glasgow-based group of musicians and songwriters who

came together to write new hymns and worship songs for the church. The mainstays of the group are Steph MacLeod, Ellyn Oliver, Allan McKinlay, Greg de Blieck, and David and Yvonne Lyon. Their vision is simple:

"We want the church to have more songs that help people of different ages, backgrounds and cultures to unite under a common theme. The gospel of Jesus eclipses and transforms all the differences that

might otherwise divide us and music can help to build those bridges."

Their first album, released in 2012, is a beautiful collection of songs some self-penned and some a reworking of older hymns. The words are set to music which draws on traditional Scottish music and folk melodies, with some blues/jazzy undertones on occasion. The result is a beautiful collection of very singable hymns which proclaim God's glory and greatness in a very personal way. Hearing an old song set to a new tune or with a different arrangement can bring a deeper or new understanding of well-kent lyrics. This is the case with Steph MacLeod's version of Psalm 23 (Crimond) with a very simple guitar and keyboard arrangement. Greg de Blieck gives the great Wesley hymn "How Can it Be" a new tune, and the recurring refrain of "How can it be?" conveys a sense of wonderment at the greatest sacrifice of all.

A standout track for me is the joyful interpretation of "Psalm 139 (Were I to Cross)" sung by well-known Scottish folk-singer Emily Smith. "How blessed I am, so bound with love

Surrounded yet so free. In doubt or blessing, life or death My Lord remains with me."

Other personal favourites include the confessional: "This is a Holy Place" movingly sung by Steph MacLeod:

" How can I enter your presence lightly

Forgetting all you've done, forgetting all you've done?
Let me remember your sacrifice, And the price at which this freedom was won"

and the David Lyon song of faith and belief: "God Most High". This is a beautiful rendition by Yvonne Lyon, one of my favourite singers. Her singing style engages the listener in a very personal way and gives this simple song great impact.

"You are my salvation
Whom shall I fear?
In darkness and temptation
My light and help are near
You are all around me
Stronger will I stand
And danger will not crush me
When we walk hand in hand."

This is a lovely album full of very singable tracks which speak to the soul. To listen to it is to feel uplifted.

Oh Precious Lord Jesus,

When did life get so complicated? Why is the Bible a book of beautiful poetry and mystery? ...And why can't I read Your Holy Word as a step by step instruction guide for life instead of going round in circles trying to get my life to operate effectively? Especially when everything seems to go wrong all at once, and it feels as though I am being pressed in from all sides.

And then a little dawn of realisation hits me like the sun peeking through a curtained window...when I was a child and felt a little overwhelmed, I would escape to another world, a glorious adventure of words wrapped in the form of a book, captivated by the twisting storylines, beautiful imagery, and wonderfully imaginative characters. I would be drawn into another dimension, where I could relate to, not just the main character, but elements of all the characters and feel lit up, enthused and inspired to take on the world. If they could do something fantastical, so could I. If they could overcome, so could I. If they could forgive and grow and move on with their life in just a few chapters, so could I. My inner child seemed to be saying that this was how I should relate better to the Bible, too. I could be enthralled and enchanted learning about a gentle saviour who was sent to the world to set us free. To come to know the essence of

His character. To learn about a Jesus who laid down His life - for me. Who laid down His life for you! As a Christian, my head understood the wonder of Jesus and how He can heal and save and change our lives for ever, but something inside still sometimes felt like I watched HIM from my window instead of enjoying a deep connection.

I wanted more of HIM in my life, so I asked HIM to show me what was missing. That is when I was led to this scripture in Psalm 27:4 which says: "this only do I seek: that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, to gaze on the beauty of the Lord and to seek HIM in His temple." (NIV) Ahh... I was seeking His benefits rather than seeking HIM. My inner dialogue was continually asking myself 'What could He do for me?' 'What could I do for HIM?' Running around in exasperation and ending up lost, confused, and frustrated. But before I could say a word, I lifted my head, and He was there. His never-ending love chasing me down every time I got lost in my own tunnel vision. There is *nothing* I can do to earn His love; He already loves me. There is nothing I have ever done or will do to stop HIM loving me. I can bury my head in confusion, or I can always look up!

I lift up my eyes to the mountain - where does my help come from? My help comes from the Lord, the Maker of heaven and earth. He will not let your foot slip — he who watches over you will not slumber; indeed, he who watches over Israel will neither slumber nor sleep. The Lord watches over you — the Lord is your shade at your right hand; the sun will not harm you by day, nor the moon by night. The Lord will keep you from all harm — he will watch over your life; the Lord will watch over your coming and going both now and for evermore. (Psalm 121, NIV)
