FINANCIAL REVIEW



As it turned out, 2018 was a better year than I dared hope after the £10,000 deficit of 2017. We received a grant of £3,000 from the Church of Scotland towards our support for KYTHE and our Church Centre redecoration costs, and it was a quiet year for building expenses. We ended up £1,500 in deficit. Our bank balances thus remained healthy at £75,000, falling by £2,000 from 2017.

However, the outlook is much less rosy, and we are budgeting a £14,000 deficit in 2019, due mainly to increases in our Ministries & Mission contribution and fabric costs. Whilst we currently have healthy sums in the bank, only £26,000 is available for general use, with the bulk designated or restricted for specified purposes, for example, Church Centre and Youth Legacy Fund. Like many organisations, the core issue is rising costs and falling or static income. Our income is not rising, so before we run into real trouble, we are launching an appeal to raise the level of our offerings.

Within this issue of Kin-nections you'll find our leaflet Giving for Growth. It's an easy read, crafted to avoid accounting-speak, encouraging you to reflect and review your current level of giving to the Church, and hopefully responding by increasing it. We are so lucky to share a vibrant Christian experience as members of the Kinross Parish Church family, but here in the back office we need more fuel to keep those fires burning brightly.

WILLIAM (BILL) SUTHERLAND: A TRIBUTE



Bill Sutherland

We remember with fondness Bill Sutherland, a true and faithful servant of this church, who died peacefully on Remembrance Sunday. His almost three decades as an Elder at Kinross Parish Church reflect his deep faith.

Bill was married to Betty, and devoted himself to caring for her when she suffered a brain

haemorrhage when their three children - Sheona, Anne, and Graeme - were only very young.

Bill was born in Grangemouth and was an active member of the Boys Brigade and his local church and became one of its youngest Elders. He trained as an upholsterer, skills he then taught to prisoners. His career in the prison service included working on the Isle of Wight, and he eventually took early retirement from prison governorship in 1993 in order to care for Betty, also an Elder, who died in 2011.

Bill's passions were singing, tending his roses and supporting his beloved Hibs football team; he delighted in his grandchildren's successes. Our prayerful good wishes go to Anne and all of Bill's family.

FROM THE MANSE... HOLY WEEK SERVICES



Dear Friends, It has always been my experience that the more you put in to something the more you get out of it, and that is certainly true in the walk of Christian faith. For many on the fringes of the Church, the

whole thing is a bit of a mystery - an irrelevance perhaps, a disappointment even - and increasing disinterest only confirms in them the preconception that Church is not for them or even that God does not have anything to say to them.

But the opposite is also true. It is one of my greatest joys when someone begins to take steps closer to God in Christ and finds new horizons opening up for them in sometimes unexpected ways within the family of faith. I rejoice to see people growing in faith and finding deep blessing as they are touched in new ways through an increasing engagement in worship, in the fellowship of others, and with the preaching of the Word.

It is sometimes said that 'the Kirk's aye asking for money' - for the record, it was actually as long ago as 2014 that there was last a focus on Christian giving - so I don't think we can be accused of pushing the subject! (You will certainly have received reminders about price rises in electricity and insurance and council tax rather more regularly!) A leaflet is inserted in this copy of Kinnections asking you to review your givings to the Church, and I commend that to your prayerful consideration. In our Sunday services during March, there will be a focus on some of the varied (and often unseen) ways in which your offerings sustain the ministry and mission of the church locally and further afield, from which many people benefit.

Although undoubtedly necessary, money is certainly not what it's all about - it's people that matter, and that is why we sought to engage with the whole membership at the back end of last year with regard to the kind of contact and visits from the Church that each person would find most helpful. This was a mammoth exercise (for which sincere thanks to all involved) and it will take some time to collate all the responses and bring forward proposals, but I hope that by the time of the next magazine we will have something definite to say.

What it has highlighted to me is that many of those on the fringes still value regular contact from their elder or a copy of this magazine. It makes me wonder what could follow if all who receive from the Church took a step closer in return and discovered what they might get out of putting a little more in?

FOCUS ON... THE CRAFT GROUP

Alice Getley reports

Back in 2007 a notice was tentatively put up inviting folk who enjoyed craft-making to come to a new group whose aim was to produce items for church fundraising events. Looking back on 12 years, they are certainly achieving their aim and so much more.

The group produces a vast array of

exquisite handmade items, as any of us who have been to their Craft Sales will attest. Last year the group raised close to £2,000 - a phenomenal amount - the majority going to

church funds but also generous donations to the Guild and Poppy Scotland.

But they also use their talent to help causes close to home and across the world: they knitted Christmas Wrap scarf gifts for Perth's Churches Action for the Homeless; colour-coded bobble hats for premature babies in UK hospitals; jackets for babies whose mothers are receiving treatment for childbirth injury (Freedom from Fistula, Africa); and they are currently knitting hats, balaclavas, neck-warmers, and fingerless mittens for the Sailors' Society. This charity was the recipient of our church's Christmas and December retiring offerings, and is also a Guild project. What the members make so lovingly with their hands is a practical

Some members of this group also produce

the beautiful banners on display in the church, including the new "All are Welcome" banner featured on the magazine cover. So modest, but so talented.

Margaret Clark points out that the group is, importantly, also about fellowship. There is lots of chat and laughter among the dozen or so who meet regularly on **Wednesdays**1.30-3pm. "Not all the group are church members - we come together

SENT FOR LENT...

An invitation from the Outreach Group

You are prayerfully invited to join the Outreach Group for Lent Studies focused on the prophecy of Micah.

Over the course of five Sunday evening sessions in the church, we will share a simple meal of oatcakes, cheese, and grapes then screen Bible readings and talks originally presented at the Keswick Convention 2018 by Chris Wright. He is the International Ministries Director of the Langham Partnership, which provides literature, scholarships, and preaching training for pastors. Filled with the power of God's

spiritual and social degradation. He put his finger on evils that were rampant then and are still with us today - gross inequality; landgrabbing greed: eviction: homelessness; political self-excusing and complacency; corruption at every level of society. Micah holds up a painful contemporary mirror. And yet! God has not finished with his

people. Beyond judgement lay restoration. Out of a mountain of injustice, the Mountain of the Lord will rise. Out of little Bethlehem. God's king will come. Out of acknowledged sin, comes forgiveness and redemption. There is hope, for "Who is like the Lord?" (as Micah's name means).

OUTCOME OF CONGREGATIONAL SURVEY

Thank you to everyone who completed a form in Church one Sunday in October, and also to those who provided the same information when they were contacted by volunteers, either by phone or personal visit, mostly during November.

We have been able to contact about 500 of our total roll of nearly 650, and the Kirk Session will now consider how we seek the views of the others.

Nearly 70% said they wanted the present four visits to continue, and this is what will happen for them. In addition, almost 100 people said they did not need or perhaps want,

EASTER THOUGHTS

Diane Taylor:

A mish-mash of memories come to mind when someone asks me about Easter. That beautiful spring-filled time of year bursting with the sights and smells of new growth, new animals, new light and wonderfully fresh yellow daffodils. A time of year that is wrapped in the warmth and love of family time spent together hunting brightly coloured Easter eggs in the back garden, attending church together and celebrating the joy and hearing squeals of children's laughter taking part in crafts and activities. Sunday morning Easter services at church dressed in our finest. Beautiful colours and beautiful new dreams. However, it is often the hard things of life that make us appreciate its beauty. The losses and tears that force us to dig deep to uncover the meaning behind it all. Easter means that I have a Saviour who understands anything I could ever go through and will never leave me. Easter means that I have a Saviour who lived and died and overcame, so I could overcome too.

Alice Getlev:

Like the swifts, swallows, and house-martins who fly away in September, so members of our church family disappear to university and college. It is therefore such a joy when, just like the swifts, swallows and housemartins in the spring, our young people regularly return at Easter, to be with their families and to come back into the church family. Welcome back!

Irene McFarlane:

I've a confession to make. I find Holy Week tough going. The reason for this is that, year after year, as the days of the events of Jesus' final week are played out, I keep turning up among the dramatis personae.

I see myself as one of the crowd waving palm branches on Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem. But then I think of the times when I have turned from him or betraved him, just as Judas did. Or I am one

of the disciples at the Last Supper who hear Jesus' words and vow support and vet who, only a short time later, when Jesus asked them in the Garden of Gethsemane to stay awake and keep guard while he prayed, allowed themselves to fall asleep. And I see myself in Peter who, despite his love for Jesus and promise to defend him, within a short time denied him three times.

How often, as someone who believes in Jesus, have I let him down? Innumerable. And every year in the re-telling of the Holy Week story, I am reminded of how I and "all have sinned, and fallen short of the glory of God" (Romans 3.23). The guilt of this can be a heavy burden.

I was thinking of this last Sunday during the morning service, just as we began singing "O for a Thousand Tongues to Sing". The message forcibly struck me as we sang these beloved, joyful words:

"Jesus, the name that charms our fears,

That bids our sorrows cease: 'Tis music in the sinner's ears, 'Tis life, and health, and peace He breaks the power of cancelled sin, He sets the prisoner free: His blood can make the foulest clean, His blood availed for me."

Christine Reid:

Good Friday is when I start thinking about the Easter story, 'Hot cross Buns' are in the shops and probably have been for weeks, but I have them on Friday. Looking at them and seeing the 'cross of Jesus' marked out in pastry on each one, it is remarkable, this little sign going into everyone's home, touching lives in different ways, just as Jesus himself did. I think about the death of Jesus and the sky turning black. What a shock! Did people realise what happened? It must have been a bit like an eclipse, no birds singing and a stillness filling the air. Then of course I look forward to Sunday, a busy day for this house! The early-morning service by Loch Leven, the sun has not yet risen, everyone is wrapped up in hats and scarves and thick coats. 'Christ is

risen' we are all shouting, the singing starts ' see what a morning gloriously bright, with the dawning of hope in Jerusalem'. We pray together, and my eyes look up to the sky. The sun breaks through. 'He is risen Indeed'. Jesus is alive and filling our lives with love.

Then home to the madness of eating chocolate eggs, thinking about the stone that covered the opening of the tomb. Jesus has risen from the dead. Rejoice.





At times, the bereavement group hears of the death of a relative of someone in our congregation and can offer support and follow on with a visit where contact can be made within travelling distance. Unless they are informed of this situation, they miss this opportunity to show their concern. If members of the congregation can let the Office or the ministers know of any such bereavement, then they will be glad to send a card or visit the bereaved (those who live locally). If they are not told, then the opportunity is missed to show the bereaved support.

Visiting Group

This group has been in operation for about 25 years and have some visitors who have served in the group for that length of time. NEWS FROM PRESBYTERY

The Presbytery of Perth is one of 46 Presbyteries which have oversight of every Church of Scotland congregation, from Shetland to Trinidad. Perth covers 24 congregations in the southern end of Perth and Kinross.

We asked one of our elders, George Hayton, who represents us on Presbytery, to give us an update and explain his role. He says: "It's a daunting task to explain about Presbytery. There's a lot goes on, much of which is important but not hugely exciting. Probably our most

important function is forward planning and helping to manage change and development. The last major change was the merging of parishes to form Mid Strathearn. We also appoint Interim Moderators and keep an oversight of vacancies".

George points out that "Presbyteries exist to support and help congregations but because they tend to become involved when there are problems, people can sometimes associate them with trouble".

Much of the work of Presbytery is done through committees. George

chairs the finance committee and sees its principal task as trying to make sure that things go smoothly. Presbytery meets four times a year. Three are on Saturdays, with a conference session in the morning and the business session in the afternoon. Both sessions are open to all, but the morning sessions are designed to be of wider interest. The next meeting is at Dunbarney Church, Bridge of Earn, on Saturday 9 March with the conference session at 10am on 'Mission and Discipleship'.

CHURCH GARDEN AND BURIAL GROUND



Members may have noticed the work carried out by the members of the CMC led by Allan Miller.

The grass was extended towards the front wall. Beyond that, anti-weed sheeting with bark on top was laid up to the front dyke and additional stone chips added to the path edges.

"Fortunate Fall" is the third studio album by Audrey Assad, which was released independently by Fortunate Fall Records in August 2013, and was produced by Assad herself.

Assad was born in 1983 to an American mother and an Arab-American father of Syrian descent. Music critics at the time of release remarked that the album was "ambitious, vulnerable, and

achingly beautiful". Others wrote

that the album "is one of the highlights according to a vast unanimous majority as we witness a moment of tranquillity, solace, enjoyableness and poignancy delivered through these tracks." For me, the stand-out track is "I Shall Not Want" co-written by Assad and Bryan Brown.

In this song, Assad contemplates the need for deliverance from the love of self and self-satisfaction, from the fear of having nothing, and from a life of worldly passions. The

meditation continues when she

thinks about the need to be understood, or the need to be accepted, or the fear of loneliness and trials. The remedy, she concludes, from contemplation of the Bible in general and maybe with an eye on Psalm 23 is "I

shall not want, when I taste Your goodness". It's not a shallow sunshine sing-along song; it deals with the nitty-gritty matters of heart, soul, and character. It is worth checking out.

Easter to me is a journey of faith. Unravelling its mystery and truth of the crucifixion is the key to living a new life free from grief, pain and suffering and one in close intimacy with Christ. The more I learn and the more I grow in spiritual knowledge, the more the enigma unravels. The more I grow in my faith and my relationship with God, the more that new perspectives come to light. Jesus died a harrowing death on the cross for you and for me. In our place he stood condemned, mocked and scorned, paying our debt and redeeming our blood. In that moment, His love poured out for us in a way that can only be wondered, pondered and realised in awe and majesty of God's dealings with us.

Christ stood silent and accused, accepting His fate in obedience to His Father in heaven. His unfathomable suffering saved us from our sins and when Jesus rose from the dead, we were set free, the battle against death was won. We have been given permission to leave our old lives behind and focus on a new way of living. A new life with all its potential for joy and choices that love and honour God. Christ is risen indeed. It is by Christ's death on the cross that we are given permission and authority to stop reliving the past and punishing ourselves over all the mistakes we have made. To stop crucifying ourselves with the burdens of grief, sin, shame and suffering. By His sacrifice, Christ has absorbed all the darkness and doubt in our lives, victorious over the grave. To create a life with Jesus which paints a new life with the bright colours of redemption and grace.....a rebirth.

The journey of faith is one of learning one layer at a time of how to apply these truths in my own life and for these taking root in my heart and not just in my head. To lift the promises of God and have them manifest in the present. We are saved by the grace of God, and not of our own understanding, covering our past, our present, our future, our Evermore.

Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight. - Proverbs 3:5-6 (NIV)
